### STEWARDSHIP CAMPAIGN: Time is of the Essence!

As is the case with every fundraising effort, our 2015-2016 Stewardship Canvass Campaign has reached its critical stage. As the sixth week of the campaign draws to a close, generous pledges from 72 pledging units have resulted in a total of \$107,954 raised toward our goal of \$120,444. That means we have attained 89.6% of the pledges needed to assure our Society's capacity to call a settled minister. We've made great progress! Grateful thanks are due to the members of our Stewardship Canvass Committee and to our members who have made their personal commitment to the Society's future.

Now the hard work lies ahead of us. The Ministerial Search Committee has worked hard for several months, and those efforts are paying off. The search team is now talking with five potential candidates and will be inviting one or more of those candidates to visit with the committee for a weekend very soon. One such visit has already been scheduled for March. This is exciting news!

But — there's always a "but" with exciting news of this kind — as the Ministerial Search Committee members proceed with this crucial work, they must be confident that our congregation totally supports their efforts and that we will reach our pledge goal. What that means is that the 34 pledging units that have not yet responded hold our Society's dream for a brighter tomorrow in their hands and in their hearts!

Thus our challenge for the weeks ahead— we must generate \$12,490 in additional pledges in order to achieve this campaign's goal and to give the Ministerial Search Committee the support it needs and deserves for all the hours its members have spent in our behalf. The pledges we make during this campaign do not become effective until May and are expected to be paid in full until the end of April 2016, so there's time to plan. Now's the time for our entire congregation to stand together and make that dream of an even brighter tomorrow become a reality for the Unitarian Universalist Society of the Daytona Beach Area. We've shown that we can meet the challenges put before us in the past; surely, we can and will meet this one.

#### **CRAIG'S COLUMN**

"That happiness is to be attained through limitless material acquisition is denied by every religion and philosophy known to humankind, but is preached incessantly by every American television set." (Robert Bellah) Every religion speaks of the foolishness of seeking happiness through material wealth. The Buddhists and Hindus speak it of as "attachment." Jesus said that it was easier for a camel to go through the eye of a needle than for someone who's rich to enter the empire of God.

Yet every time I turn on the TV, someone tells me that if I buy this or that, I will be happy. It's a lie. Although I'm far from rich, I've had more than enough experience in acquiring things to know I'll always want more. I struggle with the temptation to have much every day. I love to go shopping. I love to spend money. I love to have things. But sometimes I can manage to get myself off the treadmill of the rat race and be content with what I have. At such times, I feel less driven. I don't feel like I need to fill the emptiness of my life with more and more stuff. I am content.

What allows me to drop out of the rat race is not my will power. I've never been a particularly self-disciplined person. What helps me escape from the compulsion to have more is a strong sense that there's more to life than having much. Most of the time this sense of promise is just that, a promise and nothing more. But sometimes, the world seems to glow. In her well-known book, *Pilgrim at Tinker Creek*, Annie Dillard eloquently remembers such a moment:

"Then one day I was walking along Tinker Creek thinking of nothing at all and I saw the tree with the lights in it. I saw the backyard cedar where the mourning doves' roost charged and transfigured, each cell buzzing with flame. I stood on the grass with lights in it, grass that was wholly fire, utterly focused and dreamed. It was less like seeing than being for the first time seen, knocked breathless by a powerful glance. The flood of fire abated, but I'm still spending the power. Gradually the lights went out in the cedar, the colors died, the cells unflamed and disappeared. I was still ringing. I had been my whole life a bell, and never knew it until that moment I was lifted and struck."
