New! Vespers Services Starting in November! The Worship Committee and I are collaborating on an additional worship service to be held twice per month on the second and fourth Thursdays. Vespers services are evening services, but we'll start them at 5 p.m. so that some daylight is present for drivers. The Vespers services will be held in Room 1 and will be 45 minutes to an hour long. They will be quiet and contemplative, with readings, meditations, and recorded music. Because this service is more intimate and less public than Sunday morning worship, Vespers will include a segment for Joys and Concerns to be shared personally.

I will lead the first of these Vespers services on Thursday, November 8, at 5:00 p.m. Members of the Worship Committee will be responsible for planning and leading other Vespers. SHARE THE PLATE— Room at the Inn

In partnership with Halifax Urban Ministries and the Church of the Holy Child, and through the Alliance, ou r UU congregation will be supporting Room at the Inn as our November Share-the-Plate partner. This small local program provides a cold-weather shelter that opens for homeless families in Volusia County when it is too chilly to sleep outside.



About the same size as our UU, the Church of the Holy Child is a small Episcopal church located on Granada in Ormond Beach. Their facility will house homeless families overnight only as an overflow shelter on cold nights during the winter. On those nights, their congregation will mobilize to prepare hot meals and provide a sleeping area. The church building has shower facilities and a large kitchen, so volunteers will be able to prepare a hot dinner and breakfast the next day. However, the church will need help with the food budget. They also would love to have volunteers from our congregation to help cook and supervise for the evening.

We have an opportunity to help the homeless while we wait for a larger and more permanent shelter to be built. Helping small local charities like this one is where our UU can make a vital difference in people's lives. **Please be generous on November 18**th when we share our offering with Room at the Inn.

LIFE LONG LEARNING— Programs for November

Life Long Learning programs for 2018-2019 will be varied and include topics related to philosophy, history and the arts as well as science and education. Each session includes time for audience questions and comments. **Program are scheduled for the 2nd and 4th Wednesdays, from 4:00 to 5:30 p.m.**

"Edgar Allan Poe" — Wednesday, November 14th

Irene Curran, a literary lecturer, will discuss the originator of the detective story— Edgar Allen Poe as the Master of the Macabre, as well as his life and writings. She will illustrate how his turbulent life affected his writing, including several of his poems, "Alone" and "Annabel Lee" as well as "The Raven."

Irene Curran, a retired teacher from New Jersey, gives lectures on various authors and historical figures that she finds interesting, such as Eleanor Roosevelt, Mark Twain and Agatha Christie. Irene received her B.A. degree in History from Molloy College in Rockville Centre, N.Y. in 1973 and her Masters' Degree in Reading from C.W. Post College in Brookville, N.Y. in 1978. She also earned her supervisor's certification from TCNJ, N.J. She now speaks at libraries, nursing homes and senior centers in New Jersey and Florida.

"American Anti-Intellectualism" — Wednesday, November 28th

Jim Rothweiler will discuss the founding of the United States and our Constitution as based on the philosophy of Reason and the climax of the Enlightenment -- the 18th-century attempt to combine science and learning with self-governance. However, we seemed to have drifted from those lofty ideals. Embedded in our culture is a force that could be a dialectical seed of destruction: Anti-Intellectualism. It is defined as opposition or hostility toward educated people and academic, artistic, social, and scientific theories associated with them. It is the belief that common sense and faith are more important than facts, reason and critical thinking. This talk will explore the historical context of Anti-Intellectualism and its implications for our future

Jim Rothweiler, with degrees in sociology and business, spent 35 years in the telecom industry conducting research to identify and analyze market needs for new services. Jim attended his first UU community in Morristown, NJ in 1981, and has been with the UU in Ormond since 2010.

FAITH Chooses Our Own

At the October 15th FAITH Community Problem Assembly, our very own Rev. Kathy Tew Rickey was elected as Co-President of FAITH. The Rev. Pedro Dash of the Tubman-King Community Church in Daytona Beach was elected as Co-President along with Rev. Kathy.



The FAITH organization (Fighting Against Injustice Toward Harmony) includes over 32 Volusia County religious congregations that come together to "address the root causes" of social justice problems in our community.

During the October Assembly, the issue of housing was chosen by vote of those attending as the "Problem Issue" to be addressed by FAITH during the coming year. This issue was identified as a major concern during 56 house meetings held throughout Volusia County. During these house meetings, participants identified a number of local community problems and social injustices they see as important issues to address. Other problem areas on the ballot were Health & Eldercare, Mental Health & Addiction, and Crime. The attendees also approved participation in DATA's statewide Criminal Justice collaborative. A total of 394 house meeting participants committed to being FAITH Network members.
