A WORD FROM OUR MINISTER— An Invitation to Side with Love on March 30th

First, I want to thank those who came to the February 18th Affordable Housing Vigil in DeLand. A dozen of you showed up in your goldenrod t-shirts to bear public witness to the severe lack of affordable housing in Volusia County. Along with 40 other members of the F.A.I.T.H. (Fighting Against Injustice Toward Harmony) organization, we packed the County Council Chambers and stood while Rev. Ben Collins and Father Phil Egitto respectfully requested that the Council fund an Affordable Housing Trust Fund to alleviate the 16,000-unit shortage of reasonably priced housing for lower income workers in Volusia County.

Last year the F.A.I.T.H. issue was Affordable Housing. The research showed that the most effective way of alleviating Volusia's shortage is for the County to establish an Affordable Housing Trust Fund of \$7 million dollars with a dedicated annual funding source of the same. At last year's Action Assembly, three of the seven County Commissioners committed to do so — Billie Wheeler, Barb Girtman, and Heather Post. We need more commissioners to commit to the proposal so that Affordable Housing continues as the F.A.I.T.H. priority for the **Action Assembly** at the **Peabody Auditorium** on **Monday, March 30**, at **6:30 p.m.**

I cannot stress enough how "people power" has led to the past successes like First Step Shelter, the Restorative Justice program in county schools, and equipping first responders with Narcan. These and more permanent solutions to community problems have come about because YOU showed up for justice. The most effective way to let municipal leaders know that an issue matters is for their constituents to show up in number. Last year, we had over 1,600 people at the Action Assembly. This year, in 2020, the goal is for 2,020 people to attend the Action Assembly.

A Challenge: This year, I'm taking a cue from Father Phil and offering a challenge to our congregation. Any Justice Ministry Network Member who brings five or more people to the Action Assembly on March 30 will be treated to a barbeque party at my house in May. The five people you bring can be fellow congregants, family, friends, neighbors, or anyone you know who has a stake in the issue of Affordable Housing.

FAMILY RENEW COMMUNITY—Our Share-the-Plate Partner

Our UU Alliance has chosen Family Renew Community to receive our Share-the-Plate offering on March 15, 2020. Family Renew considers homelessness in Volusia County



to be a major concern, especially where the health and safety of children are involved. As Unitarian Universalists, we are committed to fighting for social justice and to helping families with children move toward a brighter future. Family Renew has been helping families lift themselves out of homelessness since 1989. Currently, it operates 34 temporary/transitional housing apartments in Daytona Beach, Holly Hill and DeLand.

As a non-profit organization, Family Renew provides support for these families as they work toward their own economic stability, including several services to help them break the cycle of poverty. A recent Volusia-Flagler Homeless Information Management System study highlights this effort. The study found that the 116 families and the 290 individuals who exited the Family Renew program (between January 1, 2017 and December 31, 2019) had maintained a 94% success rate for that three-year period. These folks were able to move into permanent housing and toward more stable lives.

On **Sunday, March 15**th lets continue to help give these families a second chance by digging a little deeper into our pockets to help continue its mission. Thank you.

Beatrice Schemer "Surviving the Holocaust: My Story" - March 11th



Bea Schemer will tell her story from her birth in Cronheim, Bavaria, Germany under the Nazi regime through her family's escape to South America and finally to the US. The presentation covers the rise of Nazism in Germany in the 1930's and its effect on Bea's family and the Jewish community that her father led in Cronheim, as well as her family's journey to freedom

Bea was born in Germany in 1933, the year Hitler came to power. At age four, she and her family escaped Nazi persecution to Cali,

Colombia, South America from which she and her family immigrated to the USA. Bea grew up and was educated in Jacksonville, Florida, graduating from the University of North Florida where she received the Master's Degree in Counseling. After a career in health insurance, medical practice management and social service, she retired to Daytona Beach Shores.

Dan Kennedy, Moderator, "What Does Spirituality Mean to You?" — March 25th Panelists: Betty Green, Mike Downey, Kurtland Davies and Marilyn Sapford

The term spirituality can mean various things. For some, it may mean belief in a divine power (e.g. God) and supernatural phenomena, usually associated with religion. Other people find it in the existence and functioning of the cosmos (e.g. laws of nature). A current trend for those leaving mainline churches is to say that they do not believe in traditional religion, but that they are spiritual. When asked to explain, their answers are often vague and ambiguous. This program will explore concepts of spirituality from various points of view, using a panel discussion and a Q & A format.
